There has been a shift toward collaboration and increased efficiency in the third sector due to the interest of corporate funders and independent foundations in social impact. To contribute to this development and with the support the XL Foundation and Bank of Bermuda Foundation, The Atlantic Philanthropies (Foundation) convened a standing committee, the **Bermuda Civil Society Project (BCSP)**, to review the state of the sector and plan sustainable mechanisms for benchmarking and evaluating social impact. 'Civil society', also known as the nonprofit sector, is the arena outside of the family, government and private sector where people associate to advance common interests.

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Executive Summary: The Field Mapping Project¹

Driven by good intentions, flexible regulations, and a strong economy, the third sector or civil society burgeoned in Bermuda through the 1980s and 90s, and part of the 2000s. Unfortunately, this generosity and resulting nonprofit development did not evolve the sector as much it could have. The fact is the third sector is, by and large, not that well positioned to ensure that services and programmes align with community needs, and this is particularly noticeable at a time when the needs are greater than ever. Programmes are often not held to account for being effective and measurable and the sustainability of the sector has not been addressed by either adequate planning or funding for the medium and long term. Service gaps and duplications, a lack of information and public accountability, poor service planning, and inadequate performance measurement tools are the result.

In 2010, the Bermuda Civil Society Project (BCSP) Taskforce launched a Field Mapping Committee² to categorise the social service organisations in Bermuda, both governmental and non-governmental, including many registered under the Bermuda Charities Act 1978. This mapping process aimed to create a picture of the landscape of registered charitable entities³ (RCEs) and to develop an understanding of the work that is being done, the overlaps, and the gaps relative to community priorities. Through an online survey and phone interviews and by using a new comprehensive Field Mapping tool, the committee categorised approximately 481 RCEs based on their organisational profiles, key programmes and missions.

The work of the Field Mapping Committee was conducted in two phases. The first phase focused on the social services sector, and convened approximately 80⁴ non-governmental organisation (NGO⁵) representatives. Their mission was to define their work relative to a continuum of programs and services, identify gaps, and assess specific community needs relative to each of their fields of work (their core businesses). Their ultimate goal was to develop a plan of action that would drive a deeper examination of social impact. This work was captured in a report released in August 2010, entitled, "The Analysis of Social Service Agencies". In the second phase the field mapping sub-committee developed a tool to categorise the contributions of ALL registered charitable entities based on their publicised missions and key programme activities. The goal is to figure out who is doing what for whom, and ultimately, how successfully.

Initial Insights About Bermuda's Civil Society

- 1) There are a small percentage (109 out of 481 or almost 23%) of NGOs in Bermuda that offer programmes that can be measured, evaluated for effectiveness and replicated, if desired.
- 2) NGOs are concentrated in nine sub-sectors. The field map classifies registered charitable entities into one of 10 sub-sectors representing core areas of work such as education, the arts, the environment, health and human services.
- 3) Organisations concentrate in social issue areas that may not appear to align with Bermuda priorities.
- 4) Relatively few organisations in Bermuda focus on the social conditions that lead to the two consistently rated top concerns for Bermudians: Economy/ Unemployment and Crime. Fewer than five organisations focus on these two fields. Thus, this initial analysis might possibly suggest that there is insufficient capacity focused on the issues of which (based on latest available data) Bermudians are most concerned. We must consider that the number of organisations in a social issue area is only one indicator of actual capacity, but the data suggest this is an area for additional research.

The term originated from the United Nations (UN), and is normally used to refer to organizations that are not a part of the government and are not conventional for-profit business. In the cases in which NGOs are funded totally or partially by governments, the NGO maintains its non-governmental status by excluding government representatives from membership in the organization (Wikipedia, What.Is). In this document, the term NGO encompasses both nonprofits and charities.





- 5) A lack of registered policy, research and advocacy organisations active in Bermuda’s civil society is also noted. The Mapping Team hypothesize that this notable absence may be due to how charitable work is currently understood in Bermuda, which could exclude or deter unincorporated associations or companies limited by guarantee that have charitable objects that engage in or support policy, research or advocacy work, from registering as charitable entities and being able to take advantage of the benefits accrued from that status.

Lessons Learned About the Mapping Process and Continuing the Process in its Next Phase

- 1) To best serve an analysis of the effectiveness of the third sector, it must be noted that in addition to nonprofits and charities that offer services, many “non-service” entities are officially registered and consequently captured as ‘registered charitable entities’. These include: charitable trusts and foundations; religious groups; membership organisations; some PTAs and specific privatised services. The registered charities list also includes membership organisations like fraternities and sororities, the Government and private service providers. Each of these entities may make important contributions to the community and provide a benefit the public but they do not qualify as providers of measurable services relevant to this mapping exercise and we have not included them.
- 2) The list of registered charities changes on a monthly basis. Both the registration numbers and the actual registrants need to be verified against the field mapping tool, which is the actual platform in which the survey data is entered, based on the NTEE-modified taxonomy. Thus, the map/taxonomy should be updated periodically, at least once per year⁶.
- 3) A process for validating the coding of the registered charitable entities, with the agencies themselves, for future use is to be proposed. This process will inform next steps such as agreeing programme standards, coalition building, etc.

This report summarises the objectives of the field mapping project, the mapping process, and key insights that have been generated about the nonprofit.

While the insights represent an initial analysis of this current data, the BCSP expects to gain further insight through agency feedback once the report is distributed. The maintenance of this data is a point for consideration and resolution by service providers, as well as the BCSP team.

Introduction: Why is Field Mapping Important?

Field mapping yields new insights on Bermuda civil society (also known as the third sector) and helps the full range of stakeholders including NGOs, government, and philanthropic organisations improve the way in which they do their work. Specifically, the field mapping project supports three main groups:

Field Mapping Methodology

The field mapping work involved two primary steps using publicly available information on registered charities' missions and programme offerings: 1) collecting the data and 2) coding the data.

Step 1: Collecting the Data

Several sources were used to identify a full range of organisations in Bermuda's civil society sector, determine the social issues that they aim to affect (e.g. education, youth development, health, etc.), and define the activities they engage in to carry out their missions. The data collection process focused on NGOs, not government entities. However, some sources included a few government entities, which were mapped. The sources for collecting data included the following:

- **Convening Surveys:** In 2010, at a series of social service convenings facilitated by Bermuda's Inter-Agency Committee, organisations completed a survey to categorise their field of work based on coding standards set by the National Taxonomy of Exempt Entities Classification System (NTEE) taxonomy developed by the National Center for Charitable Statistics⁷. However, the survey's response rate was fairly low and its accuracy was not confirmed because some respondents classified their work based on their stated missions and others, based on their programmes; all resulting in the need for a further verification process.
- **The Centre on Philanthropy Membership Database:** The Centre on Philanthropy membership database provided a reference for determining which social issues NGOs associate themselves with. However, since these categories were 1) self-reported by the organisations with multiple 'missions' being selected in many cases, and 2) represented only member organisations, the data required further investigation to pinpoint the particular social issue which represents the primary mission of each reporting organisation.
- **Phone Interviews and Research:** Interns contracted by BCSP collected publicly available data on registered charities through websites and existing research sources. The interns also scheduled phone interviews with registered charity organisations to obtain further information.

Step 2: Coding the Data

With the data in hand, the Field Mapping Committee created BCSP common codes to organise the work of civil society organisations into a standard framework, the BCSP Modified Registered Taxonomy of Charitable Entities. This framework is based on organisations' target social issues and programmatic activities. The BCSP Common Codes were primarily based on the NTEE, considered to be an international standard, but in several cases the NTEE common codes were replaced with more detailed and relevant codes that are more specific to Bermuda. Appendix B provides more detail on the coding methodology and taxonomy.

Initial Insights About Bermuda Civil Society

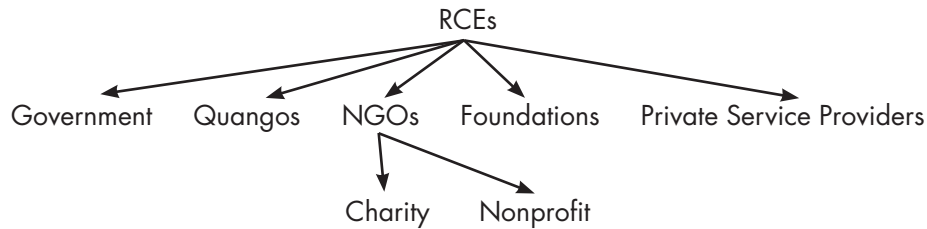
An initial analysis of the data captured via the Field Mapping Project has generated a number of useful insights into the current state of Bermuda's civil society. These insights provide information that can be directly used to maximise the efficiency and impact of future work.

⁷ The National Center for Charitable Statistics (NCCS) is the national clearinghouse of data on the nonprofit sector in the United States. The National Taxonomy of Exempt Entities (NTEE) system is used by the IRS and NCCS to classify nonprofit organisations. Insight 1: A small percentage (22.7%) of Nonprofits registered offer programmes that can be measured, evaluated and replicated⁸



The proliferation of NGOs (registered and unregistered) in Bermuda is considered to be a significant factor in driving inefficiency, financial and human resource constraints. During the 2010 social service convenings, key stakeholders estimated that close to 700⁹ NGOs (see sidebar) exist on the island, including many entities that are not officially registered with the Government¹⁰.

The Field Mapping Project identified and categorised 481 registered charitable organisations representing a wide range of what we refer to as ‘civil society organisations’ (Appendix C lists the RCEs as at February 2011 coded by field and sub-sector). An analysis based on Organisation Type (Charity, Government, Nonprofit, Private, or Quango)¹¹ illustrated that many registered charitable organisations do not offer substantive services or programming that can ultimately be 1) measured, 2) evaluated for effectiveness and 3) are based on tested models that can be or have been replicated in some way. These three criteria were used to differentiate between a charity versus a nonprofit organisation for the purposes of this mapping exercise (see sidebar). In fact, 356 out of 481 registered charitable entities (nearly 75%) were classified as charity organisations, which typically function with unpaid staff and/or with fairly limited capacity to run the type of consistent programming that would meet these criteria (Chart A-1).

Many registered charitable entities (RCEs) provide important services, quality of life supports, and other benefits for the community such as emotional support for care givers, funding and member services. Some

All charities are nonprofits but not all nonprofits are charities

Many types of organisations can become ‘Registered Charitable Entities’ (RCEs) in Bermuda. Even some government departments and businesses are listed as RCEs! With respect to NGOs though, some RCEs can be classified as ‘charities’ and some as ‘nonprofits’. This report makes an important **distinction between two types of RCEs: a charity and a nonprofit**. The distinction will become increasingly necessary if the charitable sector wishes to pursue the issue of assessing impact. According to *DifferenceBetween.com*, a **charity** is an organisation that is involved in activities such as relief operations or to fight against illiteracy, ailments and other social causes. A **charity** tends to raise money through donations and have an unsalaried workforce; workers often hold honorary posts and offer their contribution voluntarily. While all charities are nonprofit organisations, not all nonprofits are charities. **Nonprofits** may generate surplus revenues that must be retained by the organisation for its self-preservation, expansion, or plans. While many NGOs may have controlling members or board, many also have paid staff, including management while others employ unpaid volunteers and even executives who work with or without compensation (occasionally nominal). As a result, nonprofits typically strive to run programmes that can be measured, evaluated and replicated (i.e., delivered by other agencies to increase scale and reach).

are able to report achieving high programmatic impact. However, the data show that the vast majority of RCEs are not currently active in a way that is measurable or sustainable, or that some of these RCEs do not aspire to offer a set of services or programmes in this way.





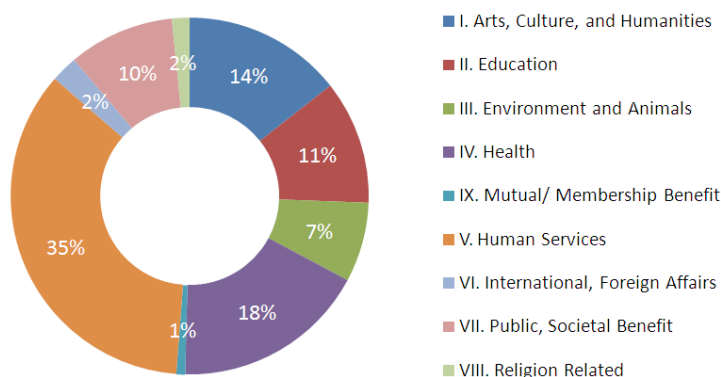

Insight 2: Nonprofit organisations are concentrated in nine sub-sectors.

The Sub-Sector is the field of work in which an organisation is engaged (see taxonomy in Appendix B). The 125 organisations¹ that were classified as a “nonprofit” organisation type, span a wide range of sub-sectors from Arts to International Affairs. Chart A-2 provides a broad overview of the Bermuda civil society landscape based on this sub-sector focus.

A-2: Active Registered Charitable Entities by Sub-Sector



As might be expected, organisations primarily focused on Human Services (35%) and Health (18%) represent a significant share of the total, accounting for more than 50% together. Mutual/ Membership Benefit, International/ Foreign affairs, and Religion Related organisations represented the smallest segments.

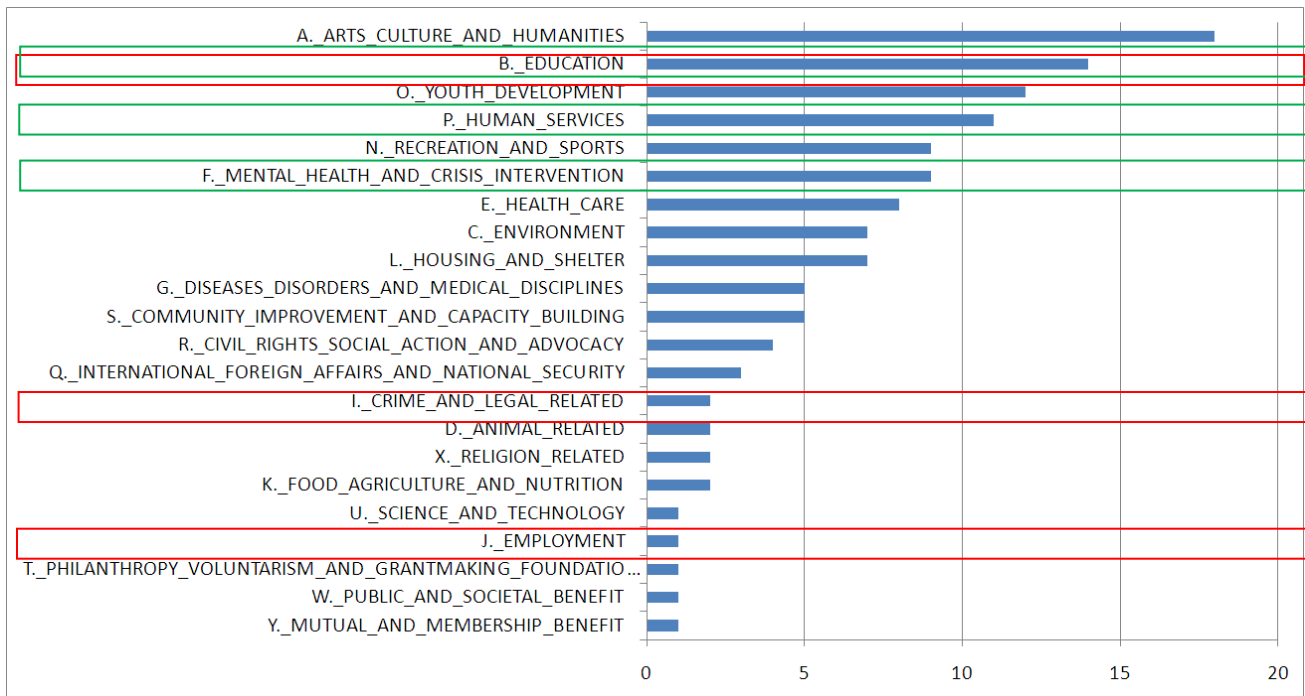
Insight 3: Organisations concentrate on social conditions that may not align with Bermuda’s priorities.

Moving one level below sub-sectors, Chart A-3 lists the 22 social issue areas, or *Fields*, (out of a possible 26) in descending order by the number of civil society organisations focusing on these areas. As shown in the chart, Arts, Education, Youth Development, and Human Services are the highest ranking in terms of the concentration of organisations doing work in these fields. It should be noted that this does not imply an over-concentration or the need to redirect funds from these to other fields.

A-3: Active Registered Charitable Entities By Field (Social Issue Area)



This data becomes even more interesting when looked at in conjunction with the social conditions that are considered to be high priorities in Bermuda. For example, according to the latest available poll by Mindmaps, published in The Royal Gazette in December 2011¹², the three top ranked issues of concern to those polled were: 1st – Economy and Unemployment (55%), 2nd – Crime (19%), and 3rd – Education (8%). These three issues are outlined in red in Chart A-3.

Looking at an example of how to use Chart A-3: Based on the BCSP Field element, there are a relatively limited number of organisations in Bermuda that focus on the social conditions that lead to the two consistently rated top concerns for Bermudians – Economy/Unemployment and Crime. Fewer than five organisations focus on these two fields. Thus, this initial analysis might possibly suggest that there is insufficient capacity focused on the issues that Bermudians are most concerned about. We must consider that the number of organisations in a social issue area is only one indicator of actual capacity, but the data suggests this is an area for further study.

The Mindmaps survey represents one quick way of determining top social issues of concern in Bermuda, and represents the opinion of the general public. However, it should be noted that this survey is a short-term indication of immediate public priorities at the time the survey is conducted, and is subject to constant change based on many factors. Another data source is the set of high-level social conditions that were identified through the 2010 social service convenings: lack of education, lack of life skills (human services), and unaddressed multi-generational trauma¹³ (mental health and crisis intervention). These social issues are outlined in green in Chart A-3.

Interestingly, the number of nonprofits addressing the priority social conditions identified through the 2010 social service convenings is greater than for the priority social issue areas identified by the Mindmaps public survey (i.e.

¹³ There are lingering questions about the clinical applicability of the term 'multi-generational trauma'. Practitioners may need to further refine it in Bermuda's context, i.e., which are the prevailing mental health conditions in Bermuda that result in multi-generational trauma or which types of drugs are most frequently used, to what extent, among which age groups? Responses to these questions would help the sector figure out whether or not the most relevant programmes are in place to address the most prevalent needs.





the areas highlighted in green are at the top of the chart). It is important to note that many of these social issues listed are inextricably linked.

Bermuda would benefit from a deeper analysis aimed at accurately identifying today’s key social issues. This would enable funders, nonprofits and the Government to determine where they could make the greatest impact with their community investment.

Once these social issues have been confirmed, there are various ways to extract valuable data from the Field Mapping database to assess the state of the sector. For example, a deeper look at Programmatic Activities undertaken by organisations within the top Mindmaps social issues (Chart A-4) illustrates how Bermuda’s nonprofit organisations focusing on conditions leading to unemployment and crime do so via direct services, but not yet in a systemic way. By contrast, in the social issue area of education, there are eight organisations providing direct services and another six organisations focusing on advocacy, capacity building/technical support, and financial support. For civil society to efficiently and effectively impact the top social issues in Bermuda, we need to assure that there are enough organisations conducting sufficient work across the range of necessary programmatic activities.

Lessons learned

Each of these entities may make important contributions to the community and provide a benefit the public but they do not qualify as measurable service providers relevant to this mapping exercise and we have not included them.
- 2) The list of registered charities changes on a monthly basis. Both the registration numbers and the actual registrants need to be verified against the mapping tool. Thus, the map/taxonomy should be updated periodically, at least once per year¹⁴.
- 3) A process for validating the codes of entities with registered charitable entities for future purposes (setting programme standards, coalition building, etc.) is to be proposed by the members of the field mapping committee or its designates, to the charitable and nonprofit community. The outputs of this type of process and tool is one which funders and the Government have reportedly been requesting for several years.

The next phase of work

The Field Mapping Project is now in the process of completing the categorisation and cleanup of the data collected from the 481 (Chart A-1) active social service organisations in Bermuda. The data is proving to be a valuable tool that can be used for various objectives across multiple stakeholder groups in civil society including NGOs, Government, and philanthropists.

In order for the data to be effectively used for decision making, the Field Mapping Committee will need to link up with the work of the other BCSP committees.

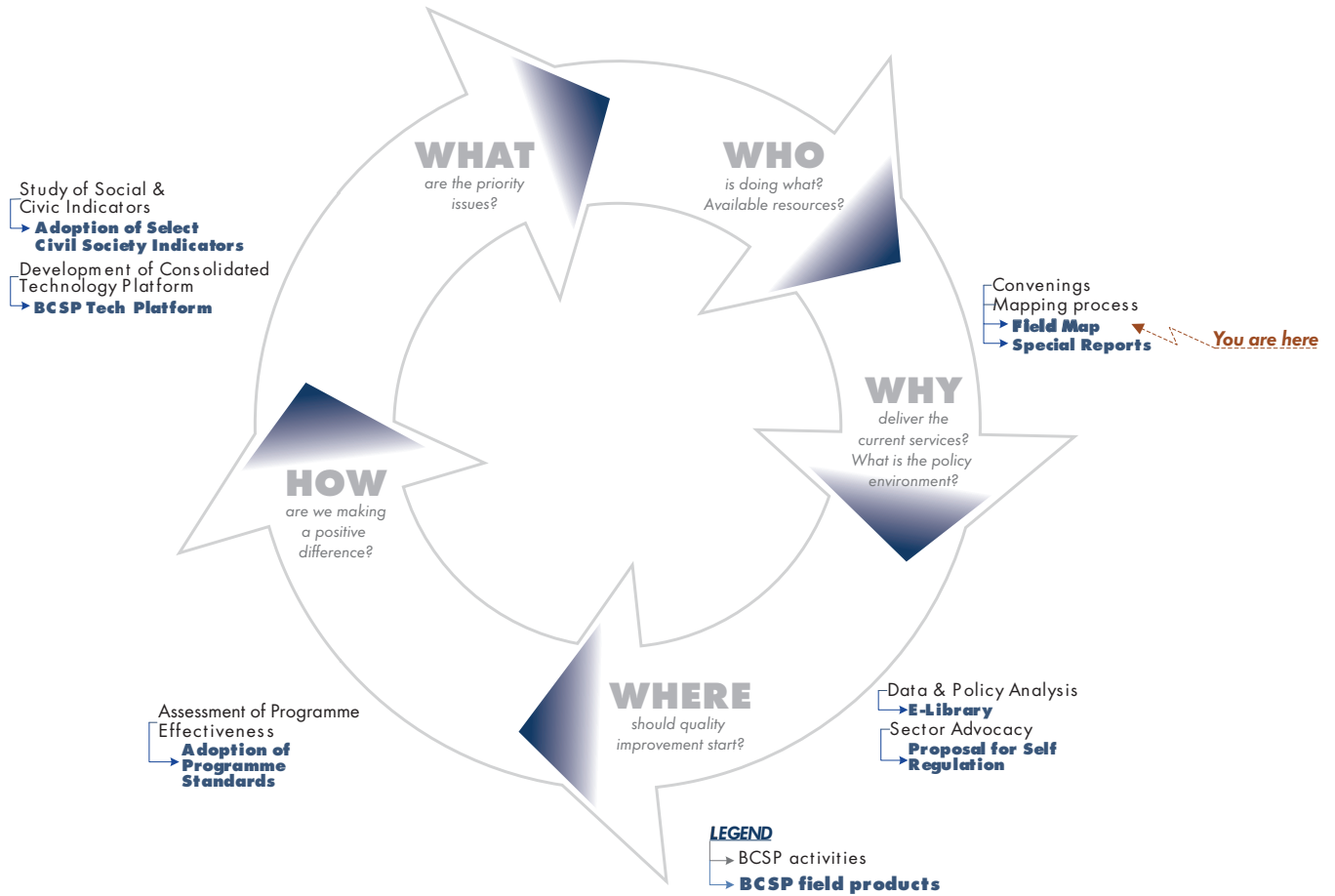
The two diagrams below illustrate the work flow of the BCSP’s multiple working committees, the interdependencies between them and anticipated products. The second presents an example of how the field mapping process can be undertaken, using the human services sector as a case study.

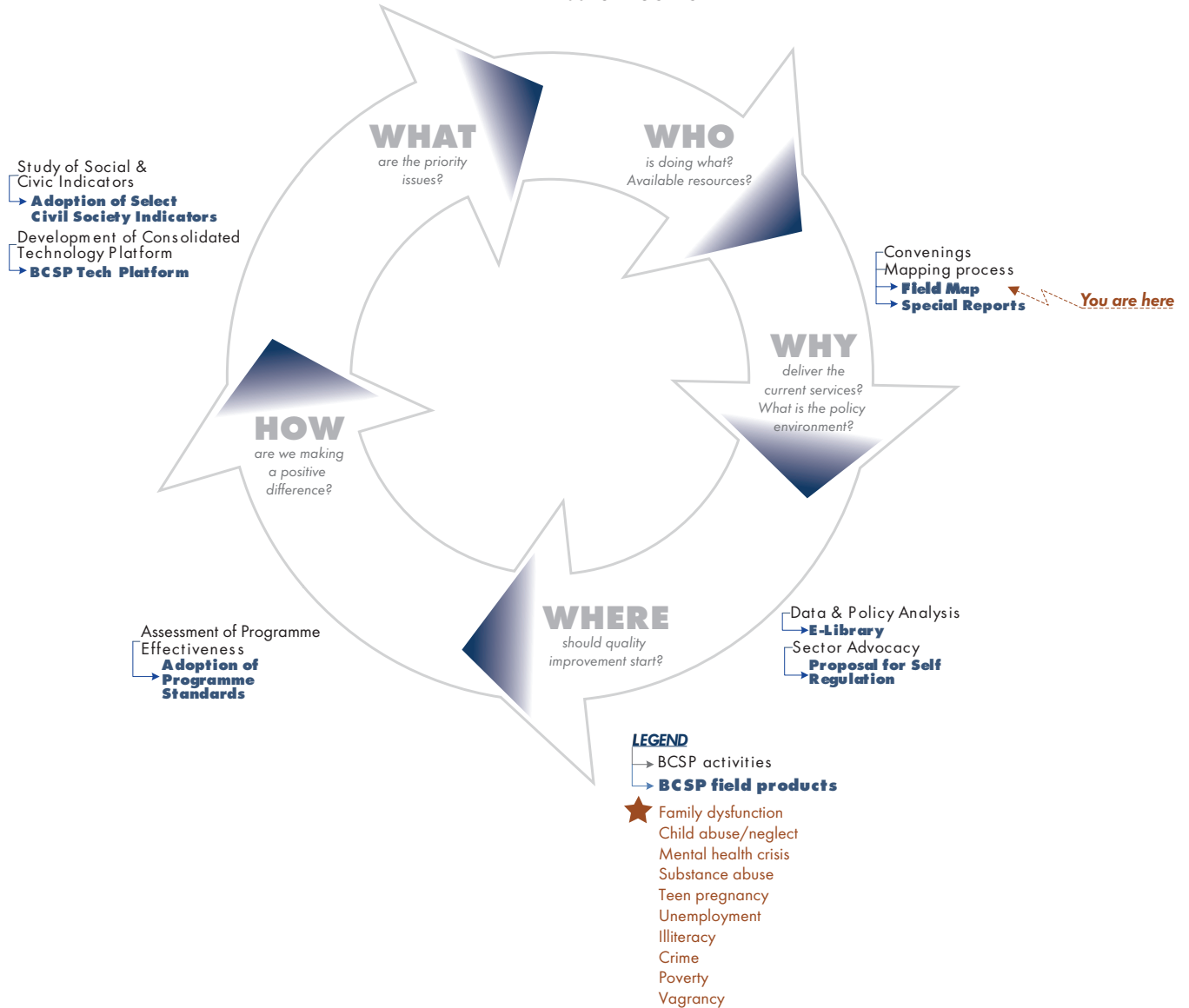


A Generic Field Mapping Process

Proposed Next Steps

The BCSP Field Mapping Committee now suggests the following steps to move the Field Mapping project into its next phase:

1. Share Report with Stakeholders and Obtain Feedback

This report and the Field Mapping Process and Methodology will be shared with NGOs to explain how they were coded and to obtain their feedback. In particular, the Field Mapping committee aims to get organisations' feedback on where they were placed in relation to potential partners in areas of work, and on how to assess their effectiveness. This is a generative and dynamic process and may result in changes to how organisations are coded.

2. Define Strategies

Key organisations from the various registered charitable entities possibly, with support from the former BCSP committee representatives, will need to form a cohesive strategy to prioritise social issues in Bermuda to focus on and determine the most effective interventions and systemic change efforts to support. The intervention points will in turn guide further research into programme effectiveness. After setting the strategy, the field mapping data will help identify the capacity of the existing civil society sector in Bermuda within the identified priority social issue areas.

3. Technology Implementation

In order to assure that the field mapping data is dynamic and accessible to all stakeholders, select portions of the data will be uploaded on a publicly accessible website as a tool (i.e. the BCSP E-Library and/or the BCSP technology platform) to be implemented by 2014. The Mapping Tool will also need to be refined for use by the general public.

4. Assess Programme Effectiveness

After the priority social issues and intervention approaches are determined, the Field Mapping Committee will work with the Programme Effectiveness Committee to assess the effectiveness of organisations working in the priority areas. The assessment will be based on benchmarks, standards of practice, and evaluation metrics identified, in part, by the Programme Effectiveness Committee and any agency representatives interested in getting involved in the process.



Appendix A: Background and overview of the Bermuda Civil Society Project

The Bermuda Civil Society Project (BCSP) is an independent, collaborative initiative launched in 2009 to clarify and improve how NGO agencies and other stakeholders deliver social mission-driven programmes and services in Bermuda. The initiative works towards better allocation of resources and supporting collaborative work in order to assess and maximise the third sector's capacity to meet and to make an impact on social needs. The project was driven by donor and non-profit communities' desire to ensure that third sector efforts are directed as effectively as possible.

The BCSP is coordinated by a task force of Bermuda funders, nonprofits and technical advisors including The Inter-Agency Committee represented by The Family Centre, Bank of Bermuda Foundation, XL Foundation, The Centre on Philanthropy, the Coalition for Community Activism (CCAB), and The Atlantic Philanthropies (a private foundation).

What is "Civil Society"?

The generally accepted definition of civil society is "the arena of un-coerced collective action around shared interests, purposes and values" (London School of Economics Centre for Civil Society).

Bermuda's Civil Society is the collection of: nonprofits; charities and community-based organisations; neighbourhood self-help schemes; non-governmental organisations; international bodies like the Red Cross; human rights campaigns and groups; and volunteers that work to improve the lives of its most vulnerable and disadvantaged people.

A wide definition of civil society includes religious organisations, trade unions, foundations and philanthropists, and any other institution outside of the corporate and government sectors. Sometimes it is referred to as the third sector.

The goals of the BCSP

- 1) Increased knowledge of the sector: to report on the state of the sector, including understanding of civil society organisations (CSOs), the services they provide (and gaps), work they do and funding streams; to improving ongoing data collection; to provide data in user-friendly formats; and, where appropriate, to enhance and standardise the data that is collected.
- 2) Increased understanding of social issues: to establish a sustainable framework for tracking progress on social issues, assessing the systemic and social impact of interventions.
- 3) Enhanced effectiveness: to build the capacity of CSOs for improved social impact.
- 4) Enhanced accountability and transparency: to improve information sharing within the third sector, and to demonstrate increased accountability to the public.
- 5) Better collaboration: to align and integrate BCSP project goals with other broader system efforts, such as the sustainable development plan.

The BCSP Project Board identified and designed specific project areas and tasks that would move its aims forward. These include:

- creating a completely new and integrated technology platform for the sector
- creating and maintaining a repository of credible, local social data
- conducting an audit and analysis of the sector
- establishing a sustainable method to evaluate effectiveness to highest global standards
- assessing civil society's overall capacity and impact on social issues
- advocating for the modernisation of the Charities Act.



Since its inception, the BCSP has succeeded in laying the groundwork for a stronger and better-informed third sector¹⁵. Even in this late mid-term phase, it has either accomplished or is well on its way to accomplishing the project outcomes, making considerable progress in: a) Increasing knowledge of the sector, specifically by reporting on the state of human service agencies and issues facing Bermuda; b) Increasing the call to establish a sustainable framework for tracking progress on social issues through sector convenings and by drafting a set of international standards for best practice at the programmatic level. Remaining goals are to: c) enhance effectiveness by building the capacity of civil society organisations to measure their impact; and to d) enhance accountability and transparency by improving information sharing within the charitable sector to demonstrate increased accountability to the public.

The BCSP Project Board believe that the Bermuda Civil Society Projects have the potential to transform the third sector, Bermuda's civil society, enabling it to serve Bermuda better than ever.

Appendix B: Field Mapping Guidance Notes

Use of the NTEE Terminology and Taxonomy

Background

The Bermuda Civil Society Project (BCSP) adopted the National Taxonomy of Exempt Entities Classification System (NTEE) taxonomy to: 1) conceptualise its thinking (and writing) about various charitable organisations on the island and; 2) to ultimately be able to map the sectors' contributors into one framework. The NTEE was developed by the National Center for Charitable Statistics as part of its keyword searching criteria. The NTEE assigns codes to RCEs based on the organisations' primary functions and was modified to suit the unique characteristics of Bermuda's third¹⁶ and philanthropic sectors.

Operationalising the NTEE Terms for Bermuda

Several sources were used to code the registered Bermuda "charities" and other entities. In 2010, a series of **social service convenings** were held, facilitated by Bermuda's Inter-Agency Committee. Attendee organisations completed a survey moderately adopted from the taxonomy. The Centre on Philanthropy made its memberships' codes available to the BCSP Field Mapping group, as reference material. Although these sources provided good backdrop information, the ways that groups categorised themselves made it difficult for the BCSP Field Mapping team to assess their primary functions (core missions), as distinguished from distinct programme activities. Therefore, the BCSP itself, contracted interns to gather all publicly available data on the registered charities, conducted web searches and other desktop research, called and emailed charity registrants. The interns prepared a coder's guide book of registered charities to aid in the coding process.

Coding Methodology

Organisation Type/ Sector: The BCSP Taxonomy was modified to allow for a choice of organisation type or sector. The reason for this modification was that some RCEs have two or three very distinct units (i.e. a distinct and varied set of services like service for seniors and a preschool, operating from a separate facility), but all registered under the same registered charity. To account for all registered entities, but not skew the number of registrants, the mapping team added a coding option. With this functionality, the BCSP was able to code an RCE, distinguish its parts, acknowledge that it falls under one registration number but not impact the total numbers of RCEs by the dual coding. The terms in this category were defined as follows:

- a. Charity: a charity is distinguished from a nonprofit in the BCSP Field Map. Charities are operationalised as having no paid staff and offering no substantive, consistent programme or service that can be ultimately measured, evaluated for effectiveness and replicated.
- b. Primary Nonprofits¹⁷ (Registered): entities with paid staffing or consistent, substantive (and in the future, the capacity to be evaluated) services or programmes.
- c. Nonprofit Affiliate or Subsidiary (1, 2 or 3): used to identify a significant programme operating from within a registered charity that has a distinctly different target population or focus from the officially registered charity (i.e. Aerie Foundation Home Care Services and Pre-School).
- d. Government (Public Service):
- e. Quasi-government (QUANGO)
- f. Private Service Provider/ Social Enterprise

¹⁶ The use of the term "Sector" is reserved to mean the entire third Sector in Bermuda (also known as civil society, the charitable, social or nonprofit sector). An option to further distinguish between charities, nonprofits, affiliate entities of registered nonprofits, Government bodies, QUANGOs and private enterprises was made available – primarily because all of these types of organisations appear on the register.

Status: The field mappers proposed adding a column called “**Status**” to articulate that after several organisational contacts, some registered entities were either inactive or did not have sufficiently adequate public information to enable a code to be generated. The Status section has three drop-down choices: a) Active; b) Inactive (self-reported); c) Insufficient Information.

Name of Charity: Self explanatory. The registered charity’s name as registered by the charity. For ease of coding, any name starting with “The” has been placed in alphabetical order based on the first word after “the”.

BCSP Sub Sector (NTEE Broad Categories and Major Groups): The NTEE major groups were kept intact for the Bermuda Mapping exercise. The BCSP uses the term “**Sub-Sector**” to refer to the NTEE Broad categories, but the categories themselves (10 in total), were kept intact. The mapping tool auto fills the Major Group category (26 options), referred to as the “**BCSP Field**” on the basis of the selection of a BCSP Sub-Sector or Broad category. The 26 field options remain.

BCSP Common Codes: The NTEE common codes have been replaced with more detailed and locally specific programmatic activity codes and target population codes. This aids in classifying the exact type of work for each organisation and also aid greatly the work of the Measures of Effectiveness sub-committee. The following compares the NTEE terminology, BCSP Social Service Report terminology, and BCSP terminology.

BCSP Programmatic Activity Codes: The NTEE Common Codes represent activities of organisations, such as research, fundraising, and technical assistance, which are common to all major groups. The seven common codes used by the NTEE are: 01 Alliance/Advocacy Organisations; 02 Management and Technical Assistance; 03 Professional Societies/Associations; 05 Research Institutes and/or Public Policy Analysis; 11 Monetary Support - Single Organisation; 12 Monetary Support - Multiple Organisations; 19 Nonmonetary Support Not Elsewhere Classified (N.E.C.).

However, these codes were determined to have little meaning in the Bermudian context¹⁸.

A **BCSP Programmatic Activity Code** was adopted from a taxonomy called the Nonprofit Programme Classification System (NPC Common/General Code List) to replace the NTEE Common Codes and Bermuda Social Service Convening Codes. The mapping tool allows for the selection of one NPC Common Code, which then self-populates with the most closely affiliated NTEE and Social Service Convening Code. The BCSP Programmatic Activity Codes are operationalised as follows:

- **A - Direct Service:** (BCSP Social Service Report codes are collapsed here: Prevention, Intervention, Treatment, Aftercare)
- **B - Advocacy** - Programmes which seek to influence public policy and/or practice within a major group area.
- **C - Awards, Prizes & Competitions-** Awards, prizes, competitions and other forms of recognition given as an acknowledgement of achievement or merit within a major group area.
- **D - Capacity Building**
- **E - Communications & Public Education-** Programmes that use a variety of techniques to educate or enlighten the public about issues within a major group area. (Social Service Report code collapsed here: - Awareness/Education)
- **F - Fundraising, Grants & Financial Support-** Programmes that solicit voluntary contributions to support events, activities and programmes related to environmental preservation and protection and/or provide monetary within a major group area.
- **G - Licensure, Accreditation & Certification-** Programmes that set standards, monitor performance, confer accreditation, or otherwise regulate the activities of nonprofit organisations within a major group area

- **H - Management, Administrative & Technical Support-** Programmes that provide consultation, technical assistance, training or management support for organisations within a major group area. Facilities Management
- **I - Membership Programmes-** Programmes that promote the interests of individuals/organisations within a major group area and provide informal, educational, and professional development opportunities for members.
- **J - Professional Development & Training-** Programmes that provide certificate classes, professional workshops and seminars, and on-site staff training within a major group area.
- **K - Research & Public Policy Analysis-** Programmes that engage in basic, applied, or developmental research within a major group area as well as analyse public policy within a major group area.
- **L - Volunteer Programmes-** Programmes that recruit, train, and utilise volunteer services within a major group.
- **Z - None of the Above**

The following **BCSP Social Service Report Terms and Definitions** were also incorporated into the BCSP Programmatic Activity Codes¹⁹:

- Advocacy: Efforts to organise groups and/or influence policy
- Awareness/Education: Sessions, workshops, trainings, gatherings or other activities aimed at informing about a particular social issue
- Prevention: Services that direct those who are vulnerable away from a given issue before they are affected by it
- Intervention: Services that aim to stop an issue as it is taking place, either through direct/immediate action, or through longer term actions, in the case of ongoing issues
- Treatment: Services that support or care for individuals/populations that have been affected by an issue after an incident of that issue and/or before they are fully removed from the direct impact of the issue; the goal of these programmes is to stop the direct impact of the given issue on beneficiaries
- Aftercare: Longer-term services that care for individuals/populations that have been affected by a given issue; these programmes seek to stabilise their beneficiaries' situation after they are no longer being directly affected by the issue, and to prevent a recurrence of the issue by supporting beneficiaries over a significant period of time

Population Codes

Three population coding options (and three opportunities to describe the range of populations served by registered charities) allowed for deeper specificity of clients served by local charitable entities:

- a. Gender Codes: G00 (General / Unspecified); G10 (Female); G20 (Male)
- b. Age – Self-explanatory. Adopted in full from the NTEE Codes - see classification sheet in appendices for options
- c. Other/Optional- This optional code allows coders to further specific the types of populations served by the charitable entity (special populations).

Services/ Activities Codes

Field mappers have determined a final set of coding that would allow the BCSP to drill down more into the specific organisational activities and services. The resources to code at this level are unavailable at this time but the final map will feature the option.

Coding “Philanthropy”

Bermuda’s philanthropic space may be atypical in some senses in that a number of independent foundations, which by law may not be required to register charities because they disburse funds rather than seek them, are registered. Pass through/raffle charities (entities that raise funds from the public to re-distribute to other charities, selected by the organisers) would be required to register. The codes for philanthropy are available through this taxonomy solely because in the United States, from where the taxonomy is adapted, foundations are required to “register”.
